I am Wanda Smith West, daughter of Louise Smith that lives on McCall Road. We are excited about the project, but concerned that at this meeting that there was no formal presentation on the project, just maps placed around the walls with individuals from the Department of Transportation. Specifically, I think the audience deserved a succinct presentation to define very specifically what the project is, what it will do, how it will affect the community, what they can anticipate, specifically to set a stage where there is a clear understanding instead of walking into an arena to say the maps are on the wall and let us know if you have questions. The questions would be a lot more meaningful and I think well thought out if we had a presentation. As a very highly educated person, of course I'm able to follow the process. as a retired educator and a member of the Board of Education it concerns me that this presentation was not set to address all of the people that are involved at whatever level with the understanding to head back to the table. I'd like to see in the immediate future a very succinct presentation time for the project and maybe even specifically to each of the property owners that would be affected. We are excited about the project and would like to see traffic lights placed in places

where it would be dangerous. I'm specifically talking about McCall Road. I am also speaking for a group larger than myself from McCall Road. Thank you.

My name is Kristen O'Neal and I have a couple of comments. I understand that the project will be completed by the State but maintained by the City of Macon to Emory Highway. I was told by Bill Causey that the city is working to try to gather SPLOST money together now for some temporary repairs on Jeffersonville Road, but my main concerns are who would continue to maintain the road after the repairs on the completion of this project being completed, and will there be a drainage system that will be in place. According to Bill Causey from the City of Macon we will have a drainage system in place, but I just want to make sure that there's going to be some system in place and there'll be money to fund. That's currently the problem now; there's no money to fund repair costs.

My name is Elaine Lucas, L-U-C-A-S. I was glad to see the beginning of some information sessions on Jeffersonville Road because this is a project that's been needed to get started for a long, long, time, however I was disappointed that there was no presentation to the public. And there were large numbers of people representing many neighborhoods who were present here

I do think we need a full understanding of the project, what phase we're in, how many phases there are, and when they can expect to see some real physical work take place.

When they started this project they told us that they would be back in two years and finish it. They are yet to come except for now they're saying they will be back this year. They stopped, they finished, right at our house. completed it right at our house. The house next door on down Millerfield Road is a problem because there's a ditch there and when it rains it backs back up on our property. It makes our property wash; we've got a wash there. We really feel like we needed a wall there in front of our home to protect our property from washing and that hill from washing down, which it has already done now. Hopefully they're going to finish right below our home and go all the way down to Jeffersonville because even though we don't live down that way, it is

uncompromising for us to -- if I'm using the right word -because it's so bad going on down. If I want to take a walk down from my home, I can't because there's no sidewalk. husband wants to take a walk, the children which are adults, but either way you can't do it without getting into the road. And it doesn't look good, it doesn't look beautifying from our house on down. And we're concerned about all those concerns; they're all our concerns. Mainly, like I said, the ditch -the wash, I'm sorry, not ditch -- in front of our home, them stopping there and not finishing with the sidewalk. Of course, we know that now that they are, and we are hoping that they will, finish, complete, the sidewalk and not take too much of our yard when they get to our yard. We were told a minute ago that they were not going to take any of our yard as far as widening the road. We'd like to know, if we can, if they are because I can't tell from that there.

I'm concerned about this project. I think there's several aspects of this project that demand much closer attention from the officials who are tasked to due diligence. The traffic projections are unrealistic. They do not follow the Federal guidelines which insist that the most recent five years of traffic counts has the greatest weight in the projections. past five years have been flat and yet they're projecting the traffic is going to go up about 50 percent in just a couple That's ridiculous and it's improper. It does not follow the formulas. Moreland-Altobelli is known to have goofed up the traffic counts on Forest Hill Road. projected steep increases ten years ago. For ten years it has been almost flat. These people have no credibility. Anyone who takes their traffic counts at face value is uninformed and/or incompetent. There's a biking disconnect. The bikepedestrian plans say that you should be able to connect biking and walking, and yet the biking, if you're going to want to bike into town, when you get to the bike path, instead of continuing on towards town, spins off north up Millerfield. The bike plan, the bike trails, need to go all the way on this

project to the Indian mounds because at the Indian mounds they can connect to the existing trails and they'll be a safe way to get all the way to the river at the Martin Luther King bridge. It's crazy not to connect the biking plan to the Ocmulgee National Monument. The traffic projections, even at their maximum number of 17,500, do not demand a five-lane facility. In Atlanta there are roads that carry over 25,000 cars a day and all they have is intersection improvements where traffic can stack. That's a two-lane road carrying far more than what they're designing this five-lane road for. That's nuts. irresponsible and it's a waste of taxpayer money. Additionally, the five-lane roads, and even three-lane roads with the center continuous turn lane, are known to be suicide lanes when the speed is over 35 miles an hour. In other words there are five lanes, a center turn lane, when your traffic is moving at 30 to 35 miles an hour or under, this facility is designed for 40 to 45 mile an hour traffic and that's when a center turn lane becomes a suicide lane. It's extremely dangerous and it's irresponsible for any road official to allow this type of design at that speed with what we know about these road designs at this time. This is 2011 -- 2012, excuse me. The intersection with Millerfield Road should be a roundabout. At most this road should be a three-lane at that point and a single lane roundabout. It's going to be a smaller facility. Be it it'll be far more than adequate to handle these 17,000

cars a day. A roundabout, a single lane roundabout, can handle 25,000 cars a day with minimal, minimal, delay. And the safety record of roundabouts is so much better than a five-lane signalized intersection that any road official who does not -who prefer the roundabout is irresponsible, incompetent, ignorant, and needs to find another job. I will refer you to the Federal highway document on roundabouts and I will refer you to the Institute -- Insurance Institute of Highway Safety; that's IIHS, Insurance Institute of Highway Safety. They have numerous documents, studies, proving, not only in the United States but across the world, that roundabouts have 40 percent less accidents, 70 percent less injuries, 90 percent fewer fatalities. Any highway designer that doesn't prefer the safer facility that costs less money, they are irresponsible, incompetent, ignorant, and should be fired. Same goes for the politicians and any road official. They should know this data. If they're not up with the modern designs, they are therefore incompetent or ignorant and they need to find another job. This entire road project, when I look at the map -- when you look at the map, this is -- what is this, a bypass? longer than the Emory Highway shortcut and it makes no sense. Eighty-seven houses will exceed a noise pollution level. should offer to buy out entirely those houses if they're going to insist on putting this kind of loud project through this neighborhood or they can make it a smaller facility and lower

the design speed, tame the traffic, and have it quieter. But they should not leave these 87 households and non-attainment for noise pollution. That's criminal. That's an environmental justice issue. I think I'll end on that environmental justice issue, period.
